**Subject:** McBratney Career and Technical Program

#### **Summary/Description:**

During the January 20, 2015, school board members received information about a new program for students that will give them a head start toward preparation for jobs that are in high demand locally and give them college credit and credentials.

William E. McBratney Jr., the Lynchburg City Schools, and Central Virginia Community College are partnering on a new program for Lynchburg high school seniors. Two of the areas of study being offered through this program are Machine Tool and Pre-Nursing. There will be 12 slots available in each program for the 2015-16 school year and another 12 slots in each program available for the 2016-17 school year. Students completing the Machine Tool program can graduate with their high school diploma, 21 college credits and a Career Studies Certificate in Machine Technology Fundamentals. Students completing the Pre-Nursing program can graduate with their high school diploma, 29 college credits and a Career Studies Certificate in Pre-Nursing I & II which were developed in conjunction with the Centra College of Nursing Program.

The funding to offer this program to students is due to the generosity of Mr. McBratney. The total tuition cost of the program will be \$193,404. Educational instruction and books will also be provided by Mr. McBratney for students so students can access these programs at no cost.

We are grateful for this partnership and for the opportunities our students will have to access these programs.

#### McBratney Career & Technical Training Program

Description

William E. McBratney, Jr., the Lynchburg City Schools and Central Virginia Community College are partnering on a new program to offer Lynchburg high schools students career specific training that will give them both a head-start toward preparation for jobs that are in demand locally as well as college credit and credentials.

Start:

Classes in two programs will be offered to students for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 school years beginning in August, 2015.

Programs:

The two programs being offered are Machine Tool and Pre-Nursing. Both will be one year in length. The projected courses and college credit hours earned are outlined below

Credentials:

The Machine Tool graduates will receive a Career Studies Certificate in Machine Technology Fundamentals that will place them well on their way toward a more advanced credential, and may give them the entry level skills for some machinist shops. The Pre-Nursing graduates will receive the Career Studies Certificates in Pre-Nursing I and II which were developed in conjunction with the Centra College of Nursing to prepare students to enter their program.

Students:

Both programs will be open to seniors from E. C. Glass and Heritage high schools.

It is anticipated that up to 12 students could be accommodated in each program (24 students total each year).

Cost:

The current CVCC tuition and fee cost is \$142 per credit hour. For purposes of estimating next year's cost we can assume a 3.5% increase and a new cost of \$147.

A Machine Tool program of 12 students with each taking 21 credits hours would cost \$37,044 in tuition and fees. Books could cost an additional \$8,064 the first year, but would belong to the college and would be used again in year two of the program.

A Pre-Nursing program of 12 students with each taking 29 credits hours would cost \$51,156 in tuition and fees. Books could cost another \$8,940 the first year, but would belong to the school and would be used again in year two of the program.

Estimated total cost for year 1 would be \$105,204, and then \$88,200 in year 2 for a total of \$193,404.

**Funding** 

CVCC will be providing the educational instruction and books, so the Program expenditures would primarily be made by the college. For that reason, it makes sense for the contributions funding the program to flow through the CVCC Educational Foundation. In the Foundation the donated funds can be segregated in a separate fund and accounted for properly.

Bill McBratney will contribute the estimated year 1 cost prior to the Lynchburg City School Board meeting on February 10th, and will also sign a pledge agreement for the payment of the estimated year 2 cost.

The school administration requests this budget adjustment be approved for the 2014-15 school year in order to fund these one-time purchases.

#### \*Additional Information on some of the above items:

**Inventory management software (\$48,800)** – LCS current have a component of an inventory management system for library books. In order to effectively manage and keep track of our electronic equipment and library books, it was deemed necessary to purchase additional inventory software to assist with this task.

**Library Materials** – **(\$105,000)** - Our schools libraries are in need of upgrading their selection of non-fiction books and novel sets. The \$105,000 will be used to increase the collection of books in our libraries as a one-time boost to align with the increased need for non-fiction texts as well as additional novel sets, particularly in secondary schools. Various e-reader technologies could also be incorporated to enhance the use of technology and literacy. The distribution, as based on identified need, would be per-pupil at each level with the following distributions by level - \$65,000 elementary, \$20,000 middle, and \$20,000 high.

**SPED Assistive Technology (\$47,000)** - There is a significant need in our division-wide autism programs for augmentive communication assistive technology. The request is to provide assistive technology devices and software for speech and language pathologists at PK-12. The purchase would include an iPad and apps (very expensive for the augmentive communication, but much cheaper than the devices were before iPads) per student, 8 students per class and 6 classes at K-12.
