SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER IN-SERVICE ACTIVITIES

The School Board places a high priority on the importance of a planned and continuing program of in-service education for its members. - 3. Subscriptions to publications addressed to the concerns of School Board members.

Thus, Lynchburg City Schools serves as the fiscal agent for this State Operated Programs (SOP) position. This state-operated position provides assessments and delivers educational services to approximately 25 students. Please note that the salary for the Literacy Coach position will continue to be paid through the Lynchburg Regional Juvenile Detention Center Education Grant. Admission Requirements P 7-10

A. Eligibility for Attendance

The following persons are eligible to attend the public schools:

1. <u>Age</u>

Persons who reach their fifth birthday on or before September 30 of the school year and persons who have not reached their twentieth birthday on or before August first of the school year.

- 2. Residents
 - a. Persons of school age who are living with a natural parent or parent by legal adoption who resides in the school division;
- b. Persons of school age whose parents are deceased and who are living with a person in loco parentis who resides in the school division;
 - C. Persons of school age who reside with a person who has been granted custody or guardianship by a court of law; and who resides in the school division
 - d. Persons of school age who reside with a foster parent appointed by a governmental agency.
 - e. Persons of school age living in the school division not solely for school purposes, as an emancipated minor.
 - f. Persons of school age who are living with a parent, guardian, or person in loco parentis in a temporary shelter in the school division, not solely for school purposes.

{A person of school age is deemed to reside in the school division

- when the person is living with a natural parent, or a parent by legal adoption, in the Lynchburg City School Division;
- when, in accordance with the provisions of Va. Code § 22.1-360, the person is living with a noncustodial parent or other person standing in loco parentis, not solely for school purposes, pursuant to a Special Power of Attorney executed under 10 United States Code § 1044b by the custodial parent;
- when the parents of such person are dead and the person is living with a person in loco parentis who actually resides within the school division;

Admission Requirements (continued)

- when the parents of such person are unable to care for the person and the person is living, not solely for school purposes, with another person who resides in the school division and is either
 - (i) the court-appointed guardian, or has legal custody of the person,
 - (ii) acting in loco parentis pursuant to placement of the person for adoption by a person or entity authorized to do so under Va. Code § 63.2-1200; or

(iii) an adult relative providing temporary kinship care as that term is defined in Va. Code § <u>63.2-100</u>. Both parents and the relative providing kinship care must submit signed, notarized affidavits

- (a) explaining why the parents are unable to care for the person,
- (b) detailing the kinship care arrangement, and
- (c) agreeing that the kinship care provider or a parent will notify the school within 30 days of when the kinship care arrangement ends.

The parent must also provide a power of attorney authorizing the adult relative to make educational decisions regarding the person. A parent or the kinship care provider must also obtain written verification from the department of social services where the parent or parents live, and the department of social services where the kinship provider lives, that the kinship arrangement serves a legitimate purpose that is in the best interest of the person other than school enrollment. If the kinship care arrangement lasts more than one year, the school division must receive continued verification directly from both departments of social services that the parents are unable to care for the person and that the kinship care arrangement serves a legitimate purpose other than school enrollment.

- when the person is living in the school division not solely for school purposes, as an emancipated minor; or
- when the person has been placed in a foster care placement within the school division by a local social services agency.

The sending and receiving school divisions will cooperate in facilitating the enrollment of any child placed in foster care across jurisdictional lines to enhance continuity of instruction. The child will be allowed to continue to attend the school in which he was enrolled prior to the most recent foster care placement, upon the joint determination of the placing social services agency and the school division that such attendance is in the best interest of the child.

No person of school age who is the subject of a foster care placement will be charged tuition regardless of whether the child is attending the school in

Admission Requirements (continued)

which he was enrolled prior to the most recent foster care placement or is attending a school in the receiving school division.

Certain other students may be admitted into the public schools of the division and may be charged tuition in accordance with Va. Code § 22.1-5 and pursuant to Lynchburg City School Board Regulation R 7-10 Admission Requirements.

No child of a person on active military duty attending a school free of charge in accordance with this policy shall be charged tuition by the school division upon such child's relocation to military housing located in another school division in the Commonwealth, pursuant to orders received by such child's parent to relocate to base housing and forfeit his military housing allowance. Such children shall be allowed to continue attending school in the school division and shall not be charged tuition for attending such school. Such children shall be counted in the average daily membership of the school division in which they are enrolled. Further, the school division in which such children are enrolled subsequent to their relocation to base housing shall not be responsible for providing for their transportation to and from school.}

3. Temporary Shelter

For the purposes of this policy, "temporary shelter" means (i) any home, single or multi-unit dwelling or housing unit in which persons who are without housing or a fixed address receive temporary housing or shelter or (ii) any facility specifically designed or approved for the purpose of providing temporary housing or shelter to persons who are without permanent housing or a fixed address.

4. Nonresidents

Nonresident students as stated in School Board Policy 7-14 of this manual.

5. Other Persons

Other persons whom the board may approve under unusual conditions, e.g., dual enrollment provision in special education and Chapter 1 regulations.

B. Enrollment Requirements

The superintendent shall have responsibility for developing and implementing regulations to ensure that students entering the public schools meet the same requirements of state law and regulations of the State Board of Education and other agencies as apply to the admission of students to the public schools.

Admission Requirements (continued)

C. Part-Time Students

Students enrolled in a private or parochial school will not be admitted to this school division on a part-time basis except as required by law.

"Board" or "State Board" means the Board of Education.

"Division superintendent" means the division superintendent of schools of a school division.

"Elementary and secondary" and "elementary or secondary" include elementary, middle, and high school grades.

"Governing body" or "local governing body" means the board of supervisors of a county, council of a city, or council of a town, responsible for appropriating funds for such locality, as the context may require.

"Parent" or "parents" means any parent, guardian, legal custodian, or other person having control or charge of a child.

<u>Code of Va.</u>, <u>§ 22.1-3</u>. <u>Persons to whom public schools shall be free</u>. "A. The public schools in each school division shall be free to each person of school age who resides within the school division. Every person of school age shall be deemed to reside in a school division:

1. When the person is living with a natural parent, or a parent by legal adoption;

2. When the person is living with an individual who is defined as a parent in § <u>22.1-1</u>, not solely for school purposes, pursuant to a Special Power of Attorney executed under Title 10, United States Code, § 1044b, by the custodial parent while such custodial parent is deployed outside the United States as a member of the Virginia National Guard or as a member of the United States Armed Forces;

3. When the parents of such person are dead and the person is living with a person in loco parentis who actually resides within the school division;

4. When the parents of such person are unable to care for the person and the person is living, not solely for school purposes, with another person who resides in the school division and is either (i) the court-appointed guardian, or has legal custody, of the person or (ii) acting in loco parentis pursuant to placement of the person for adoption by a person or entity authorized to do so under § <u>63.2-1200</u>;

5. When the person is living in the school division not solely for school purposes, as an emancipated minor; or

6. When the person living in the school division is a homeless child or youth, as set forth in this subdivision, who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. Such persons shall include (i) children and youths, including unaccompanied youths who are not in the physical custody of their parents, who (a) are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or other causes; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of alternative adequate accommodations or in emergency, congregate, temporary, or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; or are awaiting foster care placement; (b) are living in an institution that provides a temporary residence for the mentally ill or individuals intended to be institutionalized; (c) have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings; or (d) are living in parked cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and (ii) migratory children, as defined in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, who are deemed homeless as they are living in circumstances set forth in clause (i) of this subdivision.

For purposes of clause (i) of subdivision 6, "temporary shelter" means (i) any home, single or multi-unit dwelling or housing unit in which persons who are without housing or a fixed address receive temporary housing or shelter or (ii) any facility specifically designed or approved for the purpose of providing temporary housing or shelter to persons who are without permanent housing or a fixed address.

If a person resides within housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence as described in subdivision 6 that is situated in more than one school division, the person shall be deemed to reside in and shall be entitled to attend a public school within either school division. However, if a person resides in housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence as described in subdivision 6 that is located in one school division, but the property on which such housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence is located lies within more than one school division, such person shall be deemed to reside only in the single school division in which the housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence is located. Notwithstanding any such residency determination, any person residing in housing, a temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence as described in subdivision 6 that is located in one school division, but the property on which such housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence is located lies within more than one school division, shall be deemed to reside in either school division, if such person or any sibling of such person residing in the same housing or temporary shelter attends, prior to July 1, 1999, or, in the case of a primary nighttime residence as described in subdivision 6, prior to July 1, 2000, a school within either school division in which the property on which the housing, temporary shelter, or primary nighttime residence is located.

School divisions shall comply with the requirements of the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Improvements Act of 2001, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 11431 et seq.), to ensure that homeless children and youths shall receive the educational services comparable to those offered to other public school students.

School divisions serving the students identified in subdivision 6 shall coordinate the identification and provision of services to such students with relevant local social services agencies and other agencies and programs providing services to such students, and with other school divisions as may be necessary to resolve interdivisional issues.

B. In the interest of providing educational continuity to the children of military personnel, no child of a person on active military duty attending a school free of charge in accordance with this section shall be charged tuition by that school division upon such child's relocation to military housing located in another school division in the Commonwealth, pursuant to orders received by such child's parent to relocate to base housing and forfeit his military housing allowance. Such children shall be allowed to continue attending school in the school division they attended immediately prior to the relocation and shall not be charged tuition for attending such school. Such children shall be counted in the average daily membership of the school division in which they are enrolled. Further, the school division in which such children are enrolled subsequent to their relocation to base housing shall not be responsible for providing for their transportation to and from school."

Code of Va., § 22.1-5. Regulations concerning admission of certain persons to schools; tuition charges. "A. Consistent with Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of Virginia, no person may be charged tuition for admission or enrollment in the public schools of the Commonwealth, whether on a full-time or part-time basis, who meets the residency criteria set forth in § 22.1-3. No person of school age shall be charged tuition for enrollment in a general education development or alternative program offered as a regional or divisionwide initiative by the local school division in which such person is deemed to reside pursuant to §-22.1-3. Further, no person of school age shall be denied admission or charged tuition when (i) such person's custodial parent has been deployed outside the United States as a member of the Virginia National Guard or as a member of the United States Armed Forces; and (ii) such person's custodial parent has executed a Special Power of Attorney under Title 10, United States Code, § 1044b providing for the care of the person of school age by an individual who is defined as a parent in § 22.1-1 during the time of his deployment outside the United States. The person of school age shall be allowed to attend a school in the school division in which the individual providing for his care, pursuant to the Special Power of Attorney under Title 10, United States Code, § 1044b, resides. Furthermore, when practicable, such persons of school age may continue to attend school in the Virginia school division they attended immediately prior to the deployment and shall not be charged tuition for attending such division.

The following persons may, however, in the discretion of the school board of a school division and pursuant to regulations adopted by the school board, be admitted into the public schools of the division and may, in the discretion of the school board, be charged tuition:

1. Persons who reside within the school division but who are not of school age.

2. Persons of school age who are residents of the Commonwealth but who do not reside within the school division, except as provided in this section.

3. Persons of school age who are attending school in the school division pursuant to a foreign student exchange program approved by the school board.

4. Persons of school age who reside beyond the boundaries of the Commonwealth but near thereto in a state or the District of Columbia which grants the same privileges to residents of the Commonwealth.

Admission Requirements (continued)

5. Persons of school age who reside on a military or naval reservation located wholly or partly within the geographical boundaries of the school division and who are not domiciled residents of the Commonwealth of Virginia; however, no person of school age residing on a military or naval reservation located wholly or partly within the geographical boundaries of the school division may be charged tuition if federal funds provided under P.L. 874 of 1950, commonly known as Impact Aid, shall fund such students at not less than 50 percent of the total per capita cost of education, exclusive of capital outlay and debt service, for elementary or secondary pupils, as the case may be, of such school division.

6. Persons of school age who, as domiciled residents of the Commonwealth who were enrolled in a public school within the school division, are required as a result of military or federal orders issued to their parents to relocate and reside on federal property in another state or the District of Columbia, if the school division subsequently enrolling such persons is contiguous to such state or District of Columbia.

7. Persons of school age who reside in the school division and who are enrolled in summer programs, exclusive of required remediation as provided in § <u>22.1-253.13:1</u>, or in local initiatives or programs not required by the Standards of Quality or the Standards of Accreditation.

For the purposes of determining the residency of persons described in subdivisions 1 and 2 of this subsection, local school boards shall adopt regulations consistent with the residency requirements regarding persons residing in housing or temporary shelter, or on property located in multiple jurisdictions, as articulated in § <u>22.1-3</u>.

B. Persons of school age who are not residents of the Commonwealth but are living temporarily with persons residing within a school division may, in the discretion of the school board and pursuant to regulations adopted by it, be admitted to the public schools of the school division. Tuition shall be charged such persons.

C. No tuition charge authorized or required in this section shall exceed the total per capita cost of education, exclusive of capital outlay and debt service, for elementary or secondary pupils, as the case may be, of such school division and the actual, additional costs of any special education or gifted and talented program provided the pupil, except that if the tuition charge is payable by the school board of the school division of the pupil's residence pursuant to a contract entered into between the two school boards, the tuition charge shall be that fixed by such contract.

D. School boards may accept and provide programs for students for whom English is a second language who entered school in Virginia for the first time after reaching their twelfth birthday, and who have not reached 22 years of age on or before August 1 of the school year. No tuition shall be charged such students, if state funding is provided for such programs."

<u>Code of Va.</u>, <u>§ 22.1-270</u>. <u>Preschool physical examinations</u>. "A. No pupil shall be admitted for the first time to any public kindergarten or elementary school in a school division unless such pupil shall furnish, prior to admission, (i) a report from a qualified licensed physician, or a licensed nurse practitioner or licensed physician assistant acting under the supervision of a licensed physician, of a comprehensive physical examination of a scope prescribed by the State Health Commissioner performed within the 12 months prior to the date such pupil first enters such public kindergarten or elementary school or (ii) records establishing that such pupil furnished such report upon prior admission to another school or school division and providing the information contained in such report.</u>

If the pupil is a homeless child or youth as defined in § <u>22.1-3</u>, and for that reason cannot furnish the report or records required by (i) or (ii) of this subsection, and the person seeking to enroll the pupil furnishes to the school division an affidavit so stating and also indicating that, to the best of his knowledge, such pupil is in good health and free from any communicable or contagious disease, the school division shall immediately refer the student to the local school division liaison, as described in the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Improvements Act of 2001, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 11431 et seq.) (the Act), who shall, as soon as practicable, assist in obtaining the necessary physical examination by the county or city health department or other clinic or physician's office and shall immediately admit the pupil to school, as required by such Act.

B. The physician, or licensed nurse practitioner or licensed physician assistant acting under the supervision of a licensed physician, making a report of a physical examination required by this section shall, at the end of such report, summarize the abnormal physical findings, if any, and shall specifically state what, if any, conditions are found that would identify the child as handicapped.

C. Such physical examination report shall be placed in the child's health record at the school and shall be made available for review by any employee or official of the State Department of Health or any local health department at the request of such employee or official.

D. Such physical examination shall not be required of any child whose parent shall object on religious grounds and who shows no visual evidence of sickness, provided that such parent shall state in writing that, to the best of his knowledge, such child is in good health and free from any communicable or contagious disease.

E. The health departments of all of the counties and cities of the Commonwealth shall conduct such physical examinations for medically indigent children without charge upon request and may provide such examinations to others on such uniform basis as such departments may establish.

F. Parents of entering students shall complete a health information form which shall be distributed by the local school divisions. Such forms shall be developed and provided jointly by the Department of Education and Department of Health, or developed and provided by the school division and approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Such forms shall be returnable within 15 days of receipt unless reasonable extensions have been granted by the superintendent or his designee. Upon failure of the parent to complete such form within the extended time, the superintendent may send to the parent written notice of the date he intends to exclude the child from school; however, no child who is a homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision 6 of § 22.1-3 shall be excluded from school for such failure to complete such form."

Code of Va., § 22.1-271.1. Definitions. "For the purpose of § 22.1-271.2:

"Admit" or "admission" means the official enrollment or reenrollment for attendance at any grade level, whether full-time or part-time, of any student by any school.

"Admitting official" means the school principal or his designated representative if a public school; if a nonpublic school or child-care center, the principal, headmaster or director of the school or center.

"Documentary proof" means written certification that a student has been immunized, such certificate to be on a form provided by the State Department of Health and signed by the licensed immunizing physician or an employee of the immunizing local health department.

"Student" means any person who seeks admission to a school, or for whom admission to a school is sought by a parent or guardian, and who will not have attained the age of 20 years by the start of the school term for which admission is sought.

"Immunized" or "immunization" means initial immunization and any boosters or reimmunizations required by § <u>32.1-46</u>.

"School" means (i) any public school from kindergarten through grade 12 operated under the authority of any locality within the Commonwealth, (ii) any private or religious school that offers instruction at any level or grade from kindergarten through grade

twelve, and (iii) any private or religious nursery school or preschool, or any private or religious child-care center required to be licensed by the Commonwealth."

<u>Code of Va., § 22.1-271.2</u>. <u>Immunization requirements</u>. "A. No student shall be admitted by a school unless at the time of admission the student or his parent submits documentary proof of immunization to the admitting official of the school or unless the student is exempted from immunization pursuant to subsection C or is a homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision 6 of § <u>22.1-3</u>. If a student does not have documentary proof of immunization for the student; (ii) that it may not admit the student without proof unless the student is exempted pursuant to subsection C, including any homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision for the student; (ii) that it may not admit the student without proof unless the student is exempted pursuant to subsection C, including any homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision 6 of § <u>22.1-3</u>; (iii) that the student may be immunized and receive certification by a licensed physician, registered nurse or an employee of a local health department; and (iv) how to contact the local health department to learn where and when it performs these services. Neither this Commonwealth nor any school or admitting official shall be liable in damages to any person for complying with this section.

Any physician, registered nurse or local health department employee performing immunizations shall provide to any person who has been immunized or to his parent, upon request, documentary proof of immunizations conforming with the requirements of this section.

B. Any student whose immunizations are incomplete may be admitted conditionally if that student provides documentary proof at the time of enrollment of having received at least one dose of the required immunizations accompanied by a schedule for completion of the required doses within 90 days.

The immunization record of each student admitted conditionally shall be reviewed periodically until the required immunizations have been received.

Any student admitted conditionally and who fails to comply with his schedule for completion of the required immunizations shall be excluded from school until his immunizations are resumed.

C. No certificate of immunization shall be required for the admission to school of any student if (i) the student or his parent submits an affidavit to the admitting official stating that the administration of immunizing agents conflicts with the student's religious tenets or practices; or (ii) the school has written certification from a licensed physician or a local health department that one or more of the required immunizations may be detrimental to the student's health, indicating the specific nature and probable duration of the medical condition or circumstance that contraindicates immunization.

Admission Requirements (continued)

However, if a student is a homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision 6 of § <u>22.1-</u> <u>3</u> and (a) does not have documentary proof of necessary immunizations or has incomplete immunizations and (b) is not exempted from immunization pursuant to clauses (i) or (ii) of this subsection, the school division shall immediately admit such student and shall immediately refer the student to the local school division liaison, as described in the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Improvements Act of 2001, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 11431 et seq.) (the Act), who shall assist in obtaining the documentary proof of, or completing, immunization and other services required by such Act.

D. The admitting official of a school shall exclude from the school any student for whom he does not have documentary proof of immunization or notice of exemption pursuant to subsection C, including notice that such student is a homeless child or youth as defined in subdivision 6 of § 22.1-3.

E. Every school shall record each student's immunizations on the school immunization record. The school immunization record shall be a standardized form provided by the State Department of Health, which shall be a part of the mandatory permanent student record. Such record shall be open to inspection by officials of the State Department of Health and the local health departments.

The school immunization record shall be transferred by the school whenever the school transfers any student's permanent academic or scholastic records.

Within 30 calendar days after the beginning of each school year or entrance of a student, each admitting official shall file a report with the local health department. The report shall be filed on forms prepared by the State Department of Health and shall state the number of students admitted to school with documentary proof of immunization, the number of students who have been admitted with a medical or religious exemption and the number of students who have been conditionally admitted, including those students who are homeless children or youths as defined in subdivision $6 \text{ of } \frac{22.1-3}{2}$.

F. The requirement for Haemophilus Influenzae Type b immunization as provided in § <u>32.1-46</u> shall not apply to any child admitted to any grade level, kindergarten through grade 12.

G. The Board of Health shall promulgate rules and regulations for the implementation of this section in congruence with rules and regulations of the Board of Health promulgated under § <u>32.1-46</u> and in cooperation with the Board of Education."

Admission Requirements (continued)

<u>Code of Va.</u>, <u>§ 32.1-46</u>. <u>Immunization of patients against certain diseases</u>. "A. The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis of each child within this Commonwealth shall cause such child to be immunized in accordance with the Immunization Schedule developed and published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). The required immunizations for attendance at a public or private elementary, middle or secondary school, child care center, nursery school, family day care home or developmental center shall be those set forth in the State Board of Health Regulations for the Immunization of School Children. The Board's regulations shall at a minimum require:</u>

1. A minimum of three properly spaced doses of hepatitis B vaccine (HepB).

2. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of diphtheria toxoid. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entering the sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of diphtheria toxoid.

3. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of tetanus toxoid. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose of Tdap vaccine shall be administered prior to entering the sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of tetanus toxoid.

4. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of acellular pertussis vaccine. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entry into the sixth grade if at least five years have passed since the last dose of pertussis vaccine.

5. Two or three primary doses of Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine, depending on the manufacturer, for children up to 60 months of age.

6. Two properly spaced doses of live attenuated measles (rubeola) vaccine. The first dose shall be administered at age 12 months or older.

7. One dose of live attenuated rubella vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.

8. One dose of live attenuated mumps vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.

9. All susceptible children born on and after January 1, 1997, shall be required to have one dose of varicella vaccine on or after 12 months.

Admission Requirements (continued)

10. Three or more properly spaced doses of oral polio vaccine (OPV) or inactivated polio vaccine (IPV). One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A fourth dose shall be required if the three dose primary series consisted of a combination of OPV and IPV.

11. Two to four doses, dependent on age at first dose, of properly spaced pneumococcal 7-valent conjugate (PVC) vaccine for children less than two years of age.

12. (Effective October 1, 2008) Three doses of properly spaced human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine for females. The first dose shall be administered before the child enters the sixth grade.

The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis may have such child immunized by a physician or registered nurse or may present the child to the appropriate local health department, which shall administer the vaccines required by the State Board of Health Regulations for the Immunization of School Children without charge.

B. A physician, registered nurse or local health department administering a vaccine required by this section shall provide to the person who presents the child for immunizations a certificate that shall state the diseases for which the child has been immunized, the numbers of doses given, the dates when administered and any further immunizations indicated.

C. The vaccines required by this section shall meet the standards prescribed in, and be administered in accordance with, regulations of the Board.

D. The provisions of this section shall not apply if:

1. The parent or guardian of the child objects thereto on the grounds that the administration of immunizing agents conflicts with his religious tenets or practices, unless an emergency or epidemic of disease has been declared by the Board;

2. The parent or guardian presents a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Virginia, or a licensed nurse practitioner, that states that the physical condition of the child is such that the administration of one or more of the required immunizing agents would be detrimental to the health of the child; or

3. (Effective October 1, 2008) Because the human papillomavirus is not communicable in a school setting, a parent or guardian, at the parent's or guardian's sole discretion, may elect for the parent's or guardian's child not to receive the human papillomavirus vaccine, after having reviewed materials describing the link between the human papillomavirus and cervical cancer approved for such use by the Board.

Admission Requirements (continued)

E. For the purpose of protecting the public health by ensuring that each child receives age-appropriate immunizations, any physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, licensed institutional health care provider, local or district health department, the Virginia Immunization Information System, and the Department of Health may share immunization and patient locator information without parental authorization, including, but not limited to, the month, day, and year of each administered immunization; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and social security number; and the parents' names. The immunization information; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and the parents' names shall be confidential and shall only be shared for the purposes set out in this subsection.

F. The State Board of Health shall review this section annually and make recommendations for revision by September 1 to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Joint Commission on Health Care."

<u>Code of Va., § 22.1-288.1</u>. <u>Notation in school records of missing children; local law-</u> <u>enforcement cooperation.</u> "A. Each school board shall receive reports of disappearances of any children living within the school division from local law enforcement pursuant to § <u>52-31.1</u>.

B. Upon notification by a local law-enforcement agency of a child's disappearance, the principal of any school in which the child was enrolled at the time of the disappearance shall indicate, by mark, in the child's cumulative record that the child has been reported as missing. Upon notification by law enforcement that the child is located, the principal shall remove the mark from the record.

C. Upon receiving a request from any school or person for copies of the cumulative records and birth certificate of any child who has been reported by a local law-enforcement agency to be missing, the school being requested to transfer the records shall immediately notify the law-enforcement agency that provided the report to the school of the child's disappearance of the location of the school or person requesting the cumulative records and birth certificate of the child, without alerting the requestor of such report.

D. For the purposes of this section, a "mark" shall mean an electronic or other indicator that (i) is readily apparent on the student's record and (ii) will immediately alert any school personnel that the record is that of a missing child."

<u>Code of Va., §-22.1-3.2</u>. <u>Notice of student's school status required as condition of</u> <u>admission; penalty</u>. "A. Prior to admission to any public school of the Commonwealth, a school board shall require the parent, guardian, or other person having control or charge of a child of school age to provide, upon registration:

1. A sworn statement or affirmation indicating whether the student has been expelled from school attendance at a private school or in a public school division of the Commonwealth or in another state for an offense in violation of school board policies relating to weapons, alcohol or drugs, or for the willful infliction of injury to another person. This document shall be maintained as a part of the student's scholastic record.

2. A sworn statement or affirmation indicating whether the student has been found guilty of or adjudicated delinquent for any offense listed in subsection G of § <u>16.1-260</u> or any substantially similar offense under the laws of any state, the District of Columbia, or the United States or its territories. This document shall be maintained as provided in § <u>22.1-</u>288.2.

B. When the child is registered as a result of a foster care placement as defined in § 63.2-100, the information required under this section shall be furnished by the local social services agency or licensed child-placing agency that made the foster care placement.

C. Any person making a materially false statement or affirmation shall be guilty upon conviction of a Class 3 misdemeanor."

<u>Code of Va.</u>, <u>§ 22.1-277.2</u>. <u>Authority to exclude students under certain circumstances;</u> <u>petition for readmission; alternative education program</u>. "A. A student, who has been expelled or suspended for more than thirty days from attendance at school by a school board or a private school in this Commonwealth or in another state or for whom admission has been withdrawn by a private school in this Commonwealth or in another state or for whom admission has been withdrawn by a private school board in Virginia, regardless of whether such student has been admitted to another school division or private school in the Commonwealth or in another state subsequent to such expulsion, suspension, or withdrawal of admission upon a finding that the student presents a danger to the other students or staff of the school division after (i) written notice to the student and his parent that the student may be subject to exclusion, the reasons therefor, and, in the event of such exclusion, of the right to appeal the decision at a hearing before the school board or a committee thereof; and (ii) a review of the case has been conducted by the division superintendent or his designee and exclusion has been recommended.</u>

In the case of a suspension of more than thirty days, the term of the exclusion may not exceed the duration of such suspension.

Admission Requirements (continued)

In excluding any such expelled student from school attendance, the local school board may accept or waive any or all of any conditions for readmission imposed upon such student by the expelling school board pursuant to § <u>22.1-277.06</u>. The excluding school board shall not impose additional conditions for readmission to school.

If the decision by the superintendent or his designee to exclude has been appealed to a committee of the school board, the student or his parent shall be provided written notice of the right to appeal the decision to the full board, which shall, within thirty days following any such hearing, in the case of an expulsion or withdrawal of admission and, in the case of a suspension of more than thirty days, within fifteen days following any such hearing the student or his parent of its decision.

B. In lieu of the procedures established in subsection A, a school board may adopt regulations providing that a student may be excluded from attendance after (i) written notice to the student and his parent that the student may be subject to exclusion, including the reasons therefor, and notice of the opportunity for the student or his parent to participate in a hearing to be conducted by the division superintendent or his designee regarding such exclusion; and (ii) a hearing of the case has been conducted by the division superintendent or his designee, and the decision has been to exclude the student from attendance. The decision of the superintendent or his designee to exclude shall be final unless altered by the school board, upon timely written petition, as established in regulation, of the student so excluded or his parent, for a review of the record by the school board.

C. Upon the expiration of the exclusion period for an expulsion or a withdrawal of admission, which period shall be established by the school board, committee thereof, or superintendent or his designee, as the case may be, at the relevant hearing, the student may re-petition the school board for admission. If the petition for admission is rejected, the school board shall identify the length of the continuing exclusion period and the subsequent date upon which such student may re-petition the school board for admission.

D. The school board may permit students excluded pursuant to this section to attend an alternative education program provided by the school board for the term of such exclusion."

Admission Requirements

A. Eligibility for Attendance

The following persons are eligible to attend the public schools:

1. <u>Age</u>

Persons who reach their fifth birthday on or before September 30 of the school year and persons who have not reached their twentieth birthday on or before August first of the school year.

2. <u>Residents</u>

A person of school age is deemed to reside in the school division

- when the person is living with a natural parent, or a parent by legal adoption, in the Lynchburg City School Division;
- when, in accordance with the provisions of Va. Code § 22.1-360, the person is living with a noncustodial parent or other person standing in loco parentis, not solely for school purposes, pursuant to a Special Power of Attorney executed under 10 United States Code § 1044b by the custodial parent;
- when the parents of such person are dead and the person is living with a
 person in loco parentis who actually resides within the school division;
- when the parents of such person are unable to care for the person and the person is living, not solely for school purposes, with another person who resides in the school division and is either
 - (i) the court-appointed guardian, or has legal custody of the person,
 - (ii) acting in loco parentis pursuant to placement of the person for adoption by a person or entity authorized to do so under Va. Code § 63.2-1200; or
 - (iii) an adult relative providing temporary kinship care as that term is defined in Va. Code § <u>63.2-100</u>. Both parents and the relative providing kinship care must submit signed, notarized affidavits
 - (a) explaining why the parents are unable to care for the person,
 - (b) detailing the kinship care arrangement, and
 - (c) agreeing that the kinship care provider or a parent will notify the school within 30 days of when the kinship care arrangement ends. The parent must also provide a power of attorney authorizing the adult relative to make educational decisions regarding the person. A parent or the kinship care provider must also obtain written verification from the department of social services where the parent or parents live, and the department of social services where the kinship provider lives, that the kinship arrangement serves a legitimate purpose that is in the best interest of the person other than school enrollment. If the kinship care arrangement lasts more than one year, the school division must receive continued verification directly from both departments of social services

Admission Requirements (continued)

that the parents are unable to care for the person and that the kinship care arrangement serves a legitimate purpose other than school enrollment.

- when the person is living in the school division not solely for school purposes, as an emancipated minor; or
- when the person has been placed in a foster care placement within the school division by a local social services agency.

The sending and receiving school divisions will cooperate in facilitating the enrollment of any child placed in foster care across jurisdictional lines to enhance continuity of instruction. The child will be allowed to continue to attend the school in which he was enrolled prior to the most recent foster care placement, upon the joint determination of the placing social services agency and the school division that such attendance is in the best interest of the child.

No person of school age who is the subject of a foster care placement will be charged tuition regardless of whether the child is attending the school in which he was enrolled prior to the most recent foster care placement or is attending a school in the receiving school division.

Certain other students may be admitted into the public schools of the division and may be charged tuition in accordance with Va. Code § 22.1-5 and pursuant to Lynchburg City School Board Regulation R 7-10 Admission Requirements.

No child of a person on active military duty attending a school free of charge in accordance with this policy shall be charged tuition by the school division upon such child's relocation to military housing located in another school division in the Commonwealth, pursuant to orders received by such child's parent to relocate to base housing and forfeit his military housing allowance. Such children shall be allowed to continue attending school in the school division and shall not be charged tuition for attending such school. Such children shall be counted in the average daily membership of the school division in which they are enrolled. Further, the school division in which such children are enrolled subsequent to their relocation to base housing shall not be responsible for providing for their transportation to and from school.

3. Temporary Shelter

For the purposes of this policy, "temporary shelter" means (i) any home, single or multi-unit dwelling or housing unit in which persons who are without housing or a fixed address receive temporary housing or shelter or (ii) any facility specifically designed or approved for the purpose of providing temporary housing or shelter to persons who are without permanent housing or a fixed address.

Admission Requirements (continued)

4. Nonresidents

Nonresident students as stated in School Board Policy 7-14 of this manual.

5. <u>Other Persons</u>

Other persons whom the board may approve under unusual conditions, e.g., dual enrollment provision in special education and Chapter 1 regulations.

B. Enrollment Requirements

The superintendent shall have responsibility for developing and implementing regulations to ensure that students entering the public schools meet the same requirements of state law and regulations of the State Board of Education and other agencies as apply to the admission of students to the public schools.

C. Part-Time Students

Students enrolled in a private or parochial school will not be admitted to this school division on a part-time basis except as required by law.

Subject: K-12 Math Vision and Plan: 2015-16

Summary/Description:

The curriculum and instruction team has been involved in reviewing the approach to math instruction and courses. As a result of that review and meetings with a variety of stakeholders over the last several months, a vision and plan has been developed for increasing math learning at the elementary, middle, and high school levels.

LCS K-12 Math Vision and Plan for SY15-16

Rationale

Achievement scores and numerous accounts from teachers, students, and parents suggest that we must do better with supporting students for success in mathematics. Our current approach results in 54% of students passing the math SOL. In high school, the biggest impediment to meeting graduation criteria is in math, with Algebra I being the gatekeeper to a diploma and the many opportunities that can unfold beyond. The need for improvement is not only with students who are in "regular" math classes, it also is with students who move on to advanced classes. In elementary school, we have students in advanced who do not pass the SOL, a test that 100% should pass as they are working on content nearly a year beyond the assessment. The Office of Civil Rights also points to our approach to advanced courses in math as being flawed and in need of repair. Our current criteria used to identify the need for advancement is unclear and can be quite different from one school to another.

We need to set forth a better path for math learning in Lynchburg City Schools. Over the last several months, there have been numerous meetings with teachers, counselors, and administrators to investigate the ways that we are approaching math and how we can get better. We have also consulted beyond our division to gather ideas and approaches.

5 key principles guide our vision and direction:

1) REMOVE THE CEILING

In elementary school, our approach has most commonly been that of focusing on only the grade level expectations for a class and then seeking to have students meet these expectations. We have also provided supports to students with gaps below grade level. However, it is not as commonly been our practice to ensure that we know what a student already knows and elevate their opportunities beyond the base grade level expectations. We do this in many cases in reading, but it is much less common in math. We need to ensure that students - no matter the grade level or class - Kindergarten, "regular 4th" grade math, or "advanced" 4th grade math are provided opportunities beyond the base expectations of that course when they demonstrate readiness to do so.

2) RESPOND FLUIDLY TO STUDENT NEEDS AND ABILITIES

In elementary school, students should be able to move beyond grade level standards when they are ready. The establishment of fixed courses from as early as first grade can inhibit the ability of a student in a "regular" course to access higher level content when ready. It also can create a situation for a student in an "advanced" course to have a hard time filling in gaps that may exist. We need to be able to be more flexible and short-term in matching instruction to student abilities and needs. Therefore, we need to move to providing instruction matched to abilities on the basis of units rather than whole years. Those students who are ready for advanced content for a whole year will still have that access, while those ready for advancement in some units will have that access when needed. We must ensure that we are meeting a range of needs that are not fixed across all units.

3) ESTABLISH CLEAR CRITERIA FOR ADVANCEMENT

Readiness to move to middle school into a course that skips to a higher grade level of content should be accessible under the same rules for every student. In the early years, pre-assessments with each unit of study should determine a student's readiness to move on to the next challenge in that area of math. As students approach middle school, courses emerge that are fixed across a semester and year and there needs to be clear criteria for determining the appropriate course for a student. These criteria should include, as most fundamental, achievement data that represents student proficiency with content that should have been mastered from the prior year. And while this should be the first and most critical data point, we also need clear criteria that includes teacher and student/parent input.

4) ENSURE A STRONG FOUNDATION

In elementary school, for our students who struggle with math, a teacher is focused on both helping students access and learn grade level content while filling gaps in prior content. When students move into courses in middle and high school, however, this becomes increasingly difficult to accomplish. Courses are more fixed on content that, in some cases, students may be missing multiple years of foundational skills necessary in order to be successful. We have sought to remedy this by creating double blocks for some of these courses. However, the content of the courses is still mostly focused on the new content without as much opportunity to fill in prior gaps. And in high school, there is a concerning number of students who fail Algebra in ninth grade and then spend time trying to go back to relearn that content as they move forward, even though they also have gaps in content prior to Algebra. To better target these needs, we will begin a bridge class in high school that would preceed Algebra I. The purpose of the course is to help create a stronger foundation for success in Algebra I, so we are spending time to prevent failure and provide for success, rather than multiple years after Algebra I trying to go back and re-learn what was missed. We also will look at our 6th, 7th, and 8th grade classes with more of a bridge mindset in the double block.

5) INVOLVE AND INVEST STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

As we move to accomplish clearer criteria for advancement and a stronger foundation, achievement scores and clarity of process is critical. Just as important is also involving and investing our students and families. With regard to advancement, we want an achievement score to be a key data point, but we also don't want a few points to deter a highly motivated student from a course that s/he is prepared to try. We want to make the rules and criteria clear for all families and then, when a student is ready to reach for a course beyond his/her score, there is opportunity to do so by meeting with a counselor and charting a plan for how the goals of that course can be met. Achievement data should suggest courses, but students and parents should be able to reach beyond when they are ready.

A CLOSER LOOK BY LEVEL

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

At the elementary level, we will begin to move towards a math workshop/guided math approach in all classrooms, K-5. In this model, students investigate grade level standards as a whole group at the beginning of the class, then rotate through a combination of small-group instruction with the teacher and independent activities in a manner that matches their needs and readiness with the current topic. For example, a student in 3rd grade might be working on 1st or 2nd grade components of the current unit of study if s/he has gaps or could be working on 4th or 5th grade components if the student has mastered the core concepts and skills and is ready to move on. Pre-assessments and prior learning data guide what a student needs and is ready for. Students are advanced or remediated by unit of study, rather than by an entire year.

For our schools that currently have a distinction between regular and advanced classes, those already started would continue through 5th grade. In those classes, however, we would move towards the math workshop/guided math approach so that we can meet the range of needs and abilities that exist even when students have already been grouped that way.

In the future, students will be in advanced groups by unit, accessing curriculum beyond the grade level as they are ready. This means that a student who previously was in an advanced course studying concepts one grade level above could go even further through an advanced group (rather than advanced class) approach. It also means a student who was in an advanced class but struggled with some of the units could now have an opportunity to go back and shore up those skills, providing for a stronger opportunity for future success. This model of advancing students by unit rather than for the entire year should result in even more students going into advanced courses in middle school and being successful in them.

To support the math workshop model, this summer we will be developing math kits, somewhat similar to our current science kits, in which teachers will be provided with both training and materials for meeting a range of needs and abilities for each math unit (e.g. telling time, linear measurement, fractions, etc.). Training and identification of model classrooms with occur throughout next year as we build and expand our abilities to meet students by name and by need in math in elementary school.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Placement from 5th to 6th Grade

A consistent process will be in place for placement of students from 5th grade to a 6th grade math course. The placement process will involve 3 components and apply to all students in 5th grade regardless of whether they were in a regular or advanced 5th grade course.

- 1) Achievement measures Assessment of a student's proficiency in math will be used as the initial data point for determining readiness for any advanced course. For a student to go into a 6A math course (which is a course focused on 7th grade content and utilizes a 7th grade SOL test), the student should demonstrate proficiency with both 5th grade and 6th grade math content. The 5th grade achievement data will be drawn from the 5th grade SOL test and a combination of the 5th grade LCS Benchmark assessments, while the 6th grade achievement data will be indicated by the student's score on a 6th grade Benchmark assessment utilized prior to the end of the 5th grade.
- 2) Teacher recommendation While achievement data is the initial basis for the course recommendation, there also needs to be opportunity for a teacher's recommendation to play a role in providing additional opportunity, particularly if a student's test score does not accurately reflect his/her work throughout the school year, or if a student has a strong work ethic and is close to the achievement score.
- 3) Parent/student course request In cases where a student does not qualify for a course on the basis of an achievement test nor the teacher recommendation, the parent may also make a course request to go to the advanced course of that grade level. After meeting with the counselor and developing a plan for ensuring the student will be able to be successful in the requested course, the request would be granted.

Ensuring a stronger foundation

In addition to this process for consideration for advanced courses, students who are struggling to meet 5th grade standards would be placed in a double-block 6th grade regular course, as is currently the model. However, we will enhance this approach in 3 ways:

- The two blocks will be arranged such that the first half of the time will focus on gaps that students have from prior grade level math content, in relation to the current unit of study of 6th grade content. This will provide a focused time to help fill those foundation gaps and ready students for greater success with grade level content.
- 2) Schools will be provided the option of scheduling the double block back-to-back (e.g. 1st and 2nd period) or spaced during the day (e.g. 1st and 4th period). While research suggests the value of scheduling back-to-back, our implementation data has not consistently shown this approach to demonstrate that success. Therefore, we are providing schools with options for scheduling as some students may benefit from not having the time consecutive. Data will be collected from the scheduling approaches to monitor the relative success of the two approaches. Additionally, training will be provided to teachers using the back-to-back scheduling in order to implement the most effective ways to maximize this approach.

3) Training will be provided to teachers with 6R classes to support the use of data and effective practices to guide instruction in meeting areas of gaps. Additionally, manipulatives and other resources that are helpful in teaching the missed elementary concepts and skills will be provided to these classes.

In addition to this approach being instituted in 6th grade, we would then plan to also apply it to the way we utilize time in the 7th and 8th grade regular double-block classes.

HIGH SCHOOL

Approach to scheduling Algebra I

Algebra I is the primary gatekeeper to graduation.

Currently, students who did not take Algebra I in 8th grade are scheduled to take Algebra I as 9th graders. In quite a few cases, these students have not been successful on any prior math SOL (3rd through 8th grade). The likelihood of passing the Algebra I SOL in 9th grade is then very low. Students who fail then spend the next year in AFDA while also trying to re-learn Algebra I concepts in hopes of passing that SOL. However, the likelihood for a student who fails Algebra I in 9th grade to then pass it in a later grade is even lower.


The importance of passing the Algebra I SOL is immense. To graduate, the minimum requirement in math is to have three credits, of which at least one must be verified (meaning the course has a passing grade AND the SOL is passed). This one course that must be passed in math to continue towards graduation is Algebra I.

Rather than placing students with significant gaps into Algebra I in 9th grade, we plan to pilot a Math Bridge course in 9th grade. Placement in this course is determined by the student's math achievement from middle school and elementary school. Students and parents who are identified for the Bridge course but still wish to have placement in Algebra I will meet with a counselor and then be permitted to do so. Students in the Bridge course would focus on prior concepts that will enable them to be better prepared for success in Algebra I in 10th grade. After 10th grade, students would proceed with courses such as AFDA and Geometry in order to complete the three math credits.

This approach will enable teachers to focus on prior gaps rather than needing to move forward to Algebra I when students are not yet ready. The Bridge course will be a double block, and similar to middle school we will provide high school with scheduling options and monitor the results. We believe this approach to Algebra will result in more students passing Algebra I before they leave high school.

Scheduling sequence for Algebra II and Geometry

Placement in Algebra II or Geometry after the Algebra I course will be determined through a joint recommendation of the math teacher and counselor. The recommendation will also take into account the student's plans for science courses and other future courses. While students seeking an advanced track will usually continue to follow a sequence of Algebra II and then Geometry in order to have the needed math in time for related science courses (e.g. chemistry), ultimately the sequence will be a student-by-student decision with the student/parent, counselor and teacher.

SCENARIO # 1	Maria scores a 420 on the 5 th Grade Math SOL and her average score on the December/March Benchmarks is a 60. According to the proposed criteria, this student would be placed in Math 6R. The 5 th grade teacher indicates that the score is not representative of the Maria's classroom performance and recommends Maria be tested for Math 6A. The student takes the 6 th Grade Benchmark and scores a 75. Maria is placed in Math 6A Dixie scores a 460 on the 5 th Grade Math SOL. Dixie takes the 6 th
SCENARIO # 2	Grade Benchmark and scores a 73. Dixie is recommended for Math 6A.
SCENARIO # 3	John scores a 410 on the 5 th Grade Math SOL and his average score on the December/March Benchmarks is a 63. According to the proposed criteria, this student would be placed in Math 6R. John's parents request that we test John to see if he can take Math 6A. John takes the 6 th Grade Benchmark and scores a 55. John is placed in Math 6R since he did not meet the criteria of scoring 60 or above. John will also be considered for PETAL 6 if he meets the criteria.
SCENARIO # 4	Jackie scores a 415 on the 5 th Grade Math SOL and her average score on the December/March Benchmarks is a 61. According to the proposed criteria, this student would be placed in Math 6R. Jackie's parents request that Jackie be tested for 6A. This student takes the 6 th Grade Benchmark and scores an 85. Jackie is placed in Math 6A. Since the student scored high on this test, the parents once again want her tested for 7A. This request is denied since it would entail a two level parent request for advancement.
SCENARIO # 5	Rhonda scored a 410 on the 5 th Grade Math SOL and her average score on the December/March Benchmark is a 53. Rhonda is placed in Math 6R.
